Lady Evangelist Leads Richmond Hill Crusade

The Reverend Edith Mainprize, an ordained minister of the Free Methodist Church is now conducting an Evangelistic Crusade in the new Free Methodist Church, corner of Elmwood and Ruggles, Richmond Hill. After nine years as pastor of the Free Methodist Church in Napanee, Ontario, Miss Mainprize entered the field of evangelism, and has conducted similar crusades in many towns and cities of Ontario and Michigan state.

Evangelist Mainprize reminds her congregations that there have been two upper rooms which have tremendously affected the world's history. Living in a dingy flat on Dean Street, London, England, Karl Marx wrote "Das Capital", called the bible of modern communism. Now, a little more than a century later, communism controls one third of the world's population. This is more than nine hundred million people living under the tyranny of communism. Over two million men, women and children have risked death to escape communism.

But, the Bible tells of another upper room where a group of humble people awaited the coming of the promised Holy Ghost. They had been commissioned to spread the good news of salvation throughout the world, but were told by their Master to tarry until they were equipped for their task with "the power from on high". On the day of Pentecost the promised power was realized as the Holy Ghost came, destroying the principle of sin, and filling each personality with Himself.

From this upper room a movement was set in motion, which, after 1900 years continues to expand. The commission to spread the gospel is our responsibility and the supernatural equipment for the task is available. In Acts 2:29 Peter reminded his hearers that, "the promise is unto you, and to your children, and to all that are afar off, even as many as the Lord our God shall call." Miss Mainprize is assisted in this crusade by Mrs. Noreen Wardlaw of Kleinburg, Ontario, as soloist and song leader. The crusade continues until February 10.

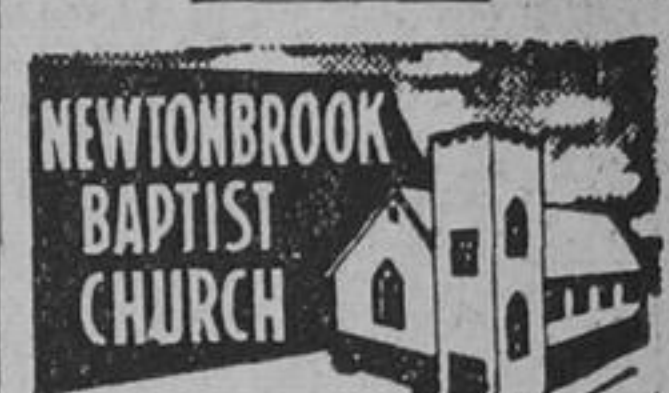
