He told a "Liberal' reporter he very often has to wait weeks before he can take any action, and while he is quite pre-pared to give this service to the community, he does suggest that anyone who has a pet should at the earliest time, telephone the police in the first place, and follow that with a call to him. There is quite a chance he might be able to save you - and your children - many hours or even days of anguish.
