



Friends sometimes complain to me that their car brakes act up when they first start out for work, but then get better through the day.

This kind of "morning sickness" can be mighty puzzling, but there's a sure way of curing it.

The cause is moisture and the way to get rid of it is to put the brakes on lightly for a few seconds as the car starts to roll away.

There's one thing about brake trouble, though, it usually gives plenty of warning that something is wrong, either by noise, or fading or grabbing.

The real enemy of brakes is heat. That's why you should try to stop the car by short off-and-on application of the brake pedal. Jamming on the brakes and leaving them there raises the temperature of the brake drums and lining by - literally hundreds of degrees.

When a serviceman recommends new brake linings it's something you should never put off. Brake drums that are scored are so much more expensive to replace than brake linings.


