Some strange things happen in the dry cleaning business. The other day a woman friend of ours came in almost in tears, with a suit that was badly stained around both shoulders.

No, she hadn't had it cleaned recently she said. She hadn't even worn it for months. It had just been hanging in the closet.

And then we saw the answer. It was those pesky shoulder pads. They are strange indeed.

The pads were made of wool and synthetic rubber. While the suit was hanging in the closet a chemical reaction set in and hydrochloric acid was manufactured. This discolored the suit.

There was, we had to tell her, nothing that dry cleaning could do. The secret is to watch closely what you're buying, not only what they look like outside, but what's inside as well.

The more common variety of shoulder pad trouble is from pads that are filled with a dark material. The color of the clothes may be fast-dyed, but not the shoulder-pad. Comes cleaning time and the shoulder pad runs. It all points up the fact that the dry cleaner has a tremendous responsibility to see that clothes are cleaned — and also to decide what clothes he cannot clean.

Actually, most manufacturers are pretty good on this point, but it's the very rarity of the problem that makes it harder.

The thing to do is to find out before you buy — either from the label or from the salesclerk — whether the garment can be cleaned. The rest, when you bring it in for that regular cleaning, is up to us.

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
