November 10 Missionary Sunday

At Local Free Methodist Church

On November 10, in cooperation with 1,250 other Free Methodist Churches in the United States and in Canada, the Free Methodist Church at the corner of Elmwood and Ruggles is stressing its obligation to the needy peoples of the world.

Rev. Warren Johnson, missionary on furlough from South Africa will speak concerning his mission field and of mission needs around the world.

Last year Free Methodist Churches contributed \$750,000 to the support of world missions. Missionary reports that there have been 50 missionary sailings during the year. Mission membership has increased in 13 years from 8,000 to over 30,000.

Free Methodist Churches have a goal of \$c per member per day which if realized would provide an annual budget of one million dollars and make possible the sending of 36 new missionaries now desperately needed in various parts of the world. Church organizations including Sunday school classes, the woman's missionary society, the junior missionary society and Free Methodist youth will participate in helping the local church meet its goal.
