

# Liquor

cense Act on the question of establishing a liquor and beer store in Richmond Hill will take place Saturday June 21st. The Voter's List used will be the same as in the Federal Election held March 31st, and the sub-divisions and voting places will be the same with few exceptions.

All residents of Richmond Hill entitled to vote in a federal election who were resident here prior to April 21st will be eligible to vote on the liquor question.

Town Clerk Russell Lynett will officiate as Returning Officer and Norman A. Todd local barrister has been appointed as Revising Officer. Voters lists will be open for inspection at the Clerk's Office, and anyone whose name is omitted may have name added by notifying the Returning Officer in writing not later than June 6th, or by appling to the Revising Officer on June 7th.

There will be two ballots, one re the establishment of a liquor store, and one regarding a beer store. Polls will be open in seventeen subdivisions from 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. Daylight Saving Time. Organizations favoring both sides of the questions are entitled to appoint an official manager for the campaign and have until May 17th to make such appointment. To date no appointment of managers for either side has been reported to the Returning Officer.


