Suppression - Flies -Extermination

Here nothing is more important than an early start. The relatively few flies which survive the winter months commence early to feed actively and lay eggs.

Decomposing animal and vegetable matter affords a common feeding and breeding medium. Consideration, therefore, should be given to garbage disposal. Garbage should be kept in watertight cans with good covers and removed frequently, especially in the warm weather. 
