RE LIQUOR LICENCE ACT VOTE

Public notice is hereby given, that in accordance with the provisions of The Liquor Licence Act, and in pursuance of a by-law passed by the municipal council of the Town of Richmond Hill on the Fourteenth day of April, 1958, I require the presence of the voters at the Town Hall in the Town of Richmond Hill on the Seventh day of June, 1958, at one o'clock in the afternoon, Standard Time, at which time I will announce the names of the persons appointed to act for the Affirmative and for the Negative respectively upon the poll to be holden under Section 69 of the Liquor Licence Act, upon the following questions,

Are you in favour of the establishment of government stores for the sale of liquor?

Are you in favour of the establishment of government stores for the sale of beer only for residence consumption?
