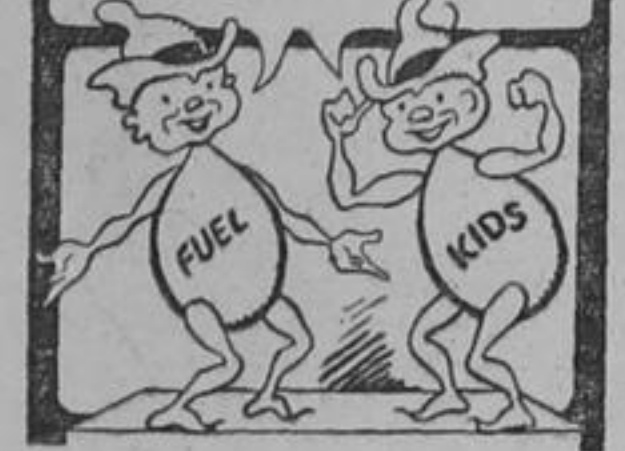

Make Worthwhile Mark Speaker Advises Grads

The graduation banquet in the Charles Howitt Public School took place on June 25th. Invited guests were Mr. and Mrs. Charles Howitt, Supervising Principal E. J. Sand, Reverend Newton-Smith, Trustee Jackson Taylor and Mr. L. Walters.

Wendy Henderson introduced Mr. Howitt, a former school inspector in this area in whose honour the Charles Howitt School was named. Mr. Howitt referred to graduation day from public school as the day on which the students begin to learn to walk by themselves, and he said that the result of their efforts in high school and all through life would depend on their work, and their attitude. He noted the Charles Howitt Public School initials on the school shield could stand for key words: C—for courage and conviction in the atomic age where 900 million people are living under Communism; H—for honor and integrity of character; P—for perseverance, keeping at it in spite of all discouragements, "for now your work will get harder and harder," he said. With Courage, Conviction and Honor, you will make a success, not necessarily money, but you will be useful citizens.

Margo Martin thanked Mr. Howitt.

Mr. Benum introduced the Reverend Newton-Smith, whose challenging address was directed to the graduation class. "You are created in the image of God, destined for great things and capable of the greatest things in life if you will determine always to seek the best, rather than seeking for something less than the best."

"Education is not merely fact. Education is when you can take the knowledges of the Ages, and with that make a valuable contribution to Life. Mr. Newton-Smith pointed out the difference between the ambitions of Alexander the Great and Mussolini and urged his young listeners to pattern their ambitions rather after men like Dr. Frederick Banting and Alexander Graham Bell.

"As I live I shall be writing a book," he told them. "As I go I cannot erase. Therefore every mark I make must be a mark that will be worthwhile."

"May you have a full life, keep going forward," Mr. Newton-Smith concluded.

and intends to specially assess a part of the cost upon the land abutting directly on the work and upon the following land which is immediately benefited by the work, namely all rateable property in Water Area Number 1 of the Township of Markham established by By-law Number 1515 except all lands laid out according to Registered Plan 2446.

2. The estimated cost of the work is \$139,958.00 of which no part is to be paid by the Corporation and is to be borne as follows:

- (a) An estimated amount of \$89,639.00 is to be assessed against the lots fronting or abutting on the work. The estimated cost per foot frontage of this part of the total cost is \$2.75. The special assessment for this part of the total cost is to be paid in twenty equal annual instalments and the estimated annual rate per foot frontage is twenty-four cents (24c).
- (b) An estimated amount of \$50,319.00 to be assessed and levied on the rateable property in the said Water Area, excluding the Highland Park Area being the land laid out according to Registered Plan No. 2446. The special assessment of this part of the total cost is to be paid in twenty equal annual instalments of \$4,387.00 and the estimated annual rate of this part of the total cost is 2.1 mills.

3. Application will be made by the Corporation to the Ontario Municipal Board for its approval of the undertaking of the said work and any owner may within 21 days after the first publication of this notice file with the Board his objection to the said work being undertaken.

4. The said Board may approve of the said work being undertaken, but before doing so it may appoint a time and place when any objections to the said work will be considered.
