

Expect Small Increase Non-resident Pheasant Licences

Game Warden E. Harper waited on Markham Township Council Monday to discuss the number of nonresident licenses to be sold this fall. Indications are there will be a small increase over the number sold last year, which was 300. Following council's earlier decision to increase the season to 10 days it was expected a corresponding increase would be made in the number of nonresident licenses to be sold.

Mr. Harper didn't favour the Vaughan plan of setting no limit on the number of non-resident licenses to be sold. "With a wide open season we would have no control whatsoever", he stated. Mr. Harper also felt a wide open season, "would antagonize the farmers". Last year's hunters were well behaved and the game warden reported he only had four infractions of the law.

Ther is no limit to the number of resident licenses sold each year. Resident licenses cost .35 cents /each and non-resident \$3.00 each. In the matter of the current rabies threat Mr. Harper stated the introduction of a \$3.00 fox bounty had encouraged people to help in reduc-
