## Answer Questions On Don Mills Widening

Victoria Square Community Hall was filled Tuesday evening of this week, for a meeting called by the Markham Township Federation of Agriculture, so that Don Mills Road property owners affected by the widening of the Don Mills Road might meet with the York County Engineer A. J. Rettie and representatives of the real estate firm of Chambers and Meredith who are handling the land settlement for Toronto and Yorks Roads Commission. It was made clear that residents are trying to be reasonable about this upheaval; that they are bewildered by the lack of value placed on their frontages by the evaluators, and that only ten owners, up to Tuesday evening of this week, had signed an agreement, where possibly 75 or 80 are involved.




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
