Hot Weather Meals

Don't overfeed your family in hot weather but don't starve them either. It is a good plan to check your summer diet against Canada's Food Rules to make sure that even in hot weathter they are receiving a balanced and adequate diet. Almost all the vegetables which you normally serve may be dressed up appetizingly in salads and served cold. Meats, eggs, cheeses and fish should all be included in your summer

It is often possible to do essential cooking in the morning so that the heat produced in the preparation of a meal does not spoil the appetite for the meal. However remember that cooked foods should be cooled as quickly as possible and refrigerated because bacteria grow quickly in foods at summer temperatures.
