Trustees Debate School Addition

Members of the Richmond Hill Public School Board met with their architects Monday evening to receive revised drawings for the addition to Beverley Acres and Walter Scott Public Schools. After discussing the revisions at some length, and approving them in general, the board decided the architects should approach the provincial Department of Education for approval of the plans after which it is hoped in about six weeks time, the Richmond Hill town council will be asked to approve of debenturing the costs. Though an accurate estimate of the costs is not possible at this stage of the proceedings, it is believed the Scott addition will be approximately \$12.00 a square foot for 13,000 square feet, or \$156,000.00 for the six classrooms, 40' x 60' general purpose room, boiler room, halls, etc. There is tentative provincial grant approval for the six classrooms at \$20,000.00 per classroom.

Chairman Robert Ross pointed out the cost of building schools was borne primarily by residential taxation and it was intended to keep costs to a minimum. Mr. Allward Sr., who was present with Mr. Peter Allward of the architectural firm of Allward and Goinlock who are making the Scott drawings, stated he interpreted the board's desire to be "a well lit, well heated school, with minimum caretaking—without dressing up."

Beverley Acres School Addition Later in the evening, Mr. Jackson of Jackson and Ypes, architects for the Beverley Acres Public School, presented revised drawings for the addition to the school. After deliberation the architects had decided it was impractical to enlarge the present kindergarten and classroom used for assembly purposes and make it into a general purpose room, 40' x 60'. Instead their plan was for a new all-purpose room and six new classrooms as one present classroom will have to be sacrificed in the remodeling. This will bring the classrooms at the school to twenty. The boiler room and other basic facilities are adequate for the 20-room school and the architects anticipate the cost will be approximately \$11.00 per square foot. Mr. Jackson estimated the total expenditure would be in the neighborhood of \$108,000.00.

Land Judging At Mount Albert On Thursday, Aug. 21

The York County land judging competition will be held August 21 on the farm of Murray Cupples, Mount Albert, and the Ontario County competition will be held August 23 on the farm of Lloyd S. Smith, Port Perry. The competitions are held under the auspices of the Metropolitan & Region Conservation Authority and the Ontario Dept. of Agriculture. Each competition includes a three-hour tour by contestants in the morning to receive instructions in soils from O.A.C. soils department staff members. The actual soil judging takes place on the farm during the afternoon. Prizes will be awarded at the end of the program. There are two classes in the

Rabies Vaccine For Free Markham Dep. Reeves Aim

Following the reading of a letter received from the County of York, notifying Markham Township Council that the fox bounty has been increased from \$3 to \$5, effective from August 31st to the end of the year, Deputy-reeve Wilfred Dean informed council that at a recent meeting he had recommended to County Council that dogs and cats in York County should be administered antirabies vaccine free. "I feel that privilege should be provided in this county for a period of one year, and it is only in the final stages, which last a few days, that rabies can be detected." All warm blooded animals, as well as people can be infected, he continued, but he also added, "we do not want to scare people, but we do want to impress caution upon them."

Councillor Stanley Watson referred to the stray dogs invading the township and asked what could be done about them since they might very well be carriers. Deputy-reeve Dean said that short of using a shotgun he didn't see how they could get rid of them, since, "they run so fast, no one can catch up with them." Further investigation as to stray dog collections will be reviewed at a later meeting, Reeve William Clark said.

Planning Board and Trees Regarding a recommendation to the planning board that something be done about the preserving of trees along highways, councillor John McNeil said, "I feel we should have 12 feet clear on all shoulders of roads where there is a 50 mile limit." He blamed the loss of at least one life a year in Markham Township on the fact that trees were too close to the roadway and referred to an accident earlier that day, Monday, when a Toronto man lost control of his car on concession 5 and was killed outright when his car hit a tree. "Had there been no tree there, it is quite possible the car would have rolled onto the field and the man would still be alive."

Another cause of fatal accidents according to Markham council are the deep ditches which will be done away with when storm sewers are installed. To Attend Opening Council voted to accept an invitation from the town of Stratford to attend the opening of the Stratford sewage plant on August 28, stating that it would be useful for future development in Markham's sewage disposal plans. Water Area No. 1 First and second readings on the proposed waterworks division for Water Area No. 1 were approved by council. Water rates charges are to be disclosed on the third reading, they will be "an equal rate per foot frontage commencing in 1959". Re T.T.C. Bus Last week in their regular meeting, Markham Council called for a meeting between Richmond Hill, Vaughan and Markham, to discuss the T.T.C. bus situation. Acting Clerk C.A. Hoover read a letter from Vaughan township in answer to this request, setting 11 a.m. next Monday, August 25th as the date, and the place, Maple. Deputy-reeve Dean noted they hope to take up the question of numbering at the same meeting if possible.

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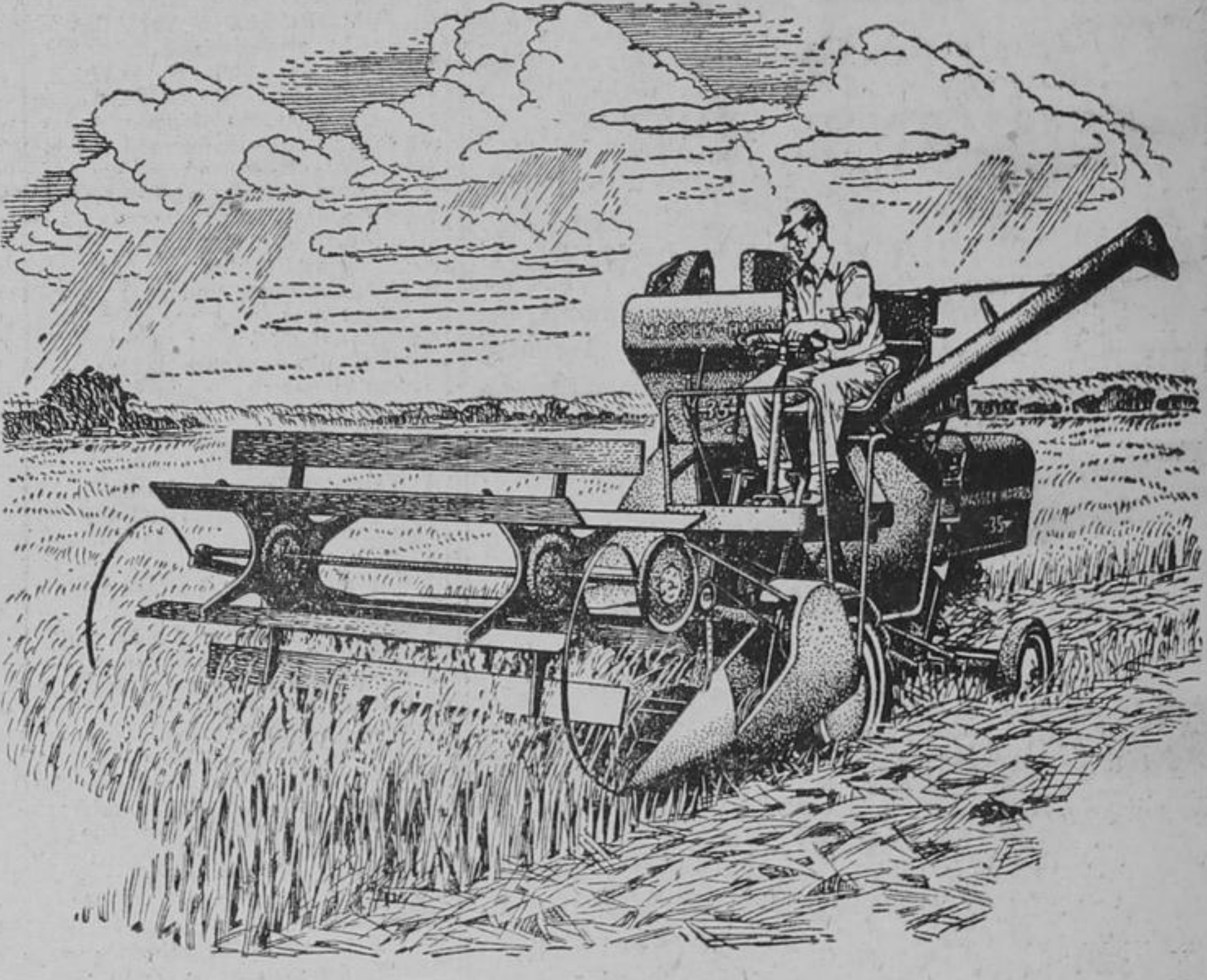
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
