In announcing the new rate schedule, Ontario Hydro stated that domestic-type customers will be billed in one of two ways, depending upon the amount of floor area heated:

Those using electricity to heat less than 25 per cent of a dwellit g's floor area will have such energy registered on existing meters and will be billed at current domestic rates;

Those heating more than 25 per cent of a dwelling's floor area will have the energy metered separately, and will be billed at a special rate. For rural domestic customers of Ontario Hydro, thi, rate will be 1.5 cents net kilowatt-hour; for domestic customers of municipal utilities, rates may vary slightly, but the minimum rate will be 1.5 cents net a kilowatt-hour.


