On Wednesday, September 24, the Richmond Hill High School Juniors played their first league game of the year against the Aurora High School. In the first quarter Gary Kozak made a 30 yard pass to Neil Pickering on Aurora's 10 yard line, where we were driven back. Gary kicked a rouge for the 1st point of the game, and a few minutes later, kicked another, giving Richmond Hill a two point lead.

In the second quarter, quarterback David Gibson lateraled to Kozak who ran it to the 10 yard line, where Jim Rushlow ran across our first touchdown which he successfully converted, making the score 9-0. The Aurora team replied with a touchdown by Bob McBurney and converted it to make the score 9-7. Richmond Hill received on the kick-

Just before half time, our Peter Addison on defense made a touchdown-saving tackle on an Aurora end-run. Kozak kicked for Richmond Hill to begin the third quarter. The convert was blocked by Kozak, making the score 16 to 13 for R.H.S. After three quarter time Aurora received the ball on their 15 yard line and were held back until Kelvin Tanner, not realizing he was scoring a T.D., picked up a fumble over the Aurora line and scored for Richmond Hill, making the final score R.H.S. 23, A.H.S. 13.

Want Province To Allow Public School Boards To Operate Retarded Schools

Permissive legislation is being sought this year by the Ontario Association for Retarded Children to allow public school boards to operate these schools. Ralph McCaw, Ph. D., psychologist and member of the Ontario and Thornhaven Education Committees, reported in a panel discussion at the September meeting of the Thornhill and District Association for Retarded Children. "It is felt there are places in the province where school boards would be willing to take over, and this would be a reduced load on the local schools for retarded children," he said. However, he explained that the legislation would be enabling only, because it would not be feasible everywhere. Arrangements might well be made for non-resident children. Also, he said, an inspector, Mrs. Stocker, formerly with York Township School, had been appointed by the Department of Education at the request of the O.A.R.C. Education Committee to give advice and assistance to the schools. She was now employed in this capacity and he hoped this work would go forward.

Dr. McCaw, A. R. Michell, president, and Mrs. W. E. Bloss, past president, comprised the panel. Dr. McCaw explained the duties of the five-member education committee set up at each association by Ontario Department of Education regulation. This com-

mittee meets five times a year at least and includes the association president and the local public school inspector. Its duties are to insure that every school in its charge shall be in accord with regulations, making proper returns. It makes sure that schools are properly insured, provides grounds and classrooms, furnishes and keeps in repair school equipment, appoints and removes teachers, fixes salaries and duties, may admit and demit pupils.

Dr. McCaw explained that the public school inspector provided the contact between the Department of Education which pays a grant of \$25 monthly per child in attendance, and the school, and the committee was otherwise appointed by the association executive committee. The chairman of the education committee sat as a member of the executive committee. He said the O.A.R.C. Education Committee at present was preparing an amplified version of the committee's duties to be issued in pamphlet form.

The meeting heard from Mrs. L. Redman, chairman of the bazaar committee. Preparations for the bazaar were well in hand, she said. This year letters had been sent to various local organizations asking for help and the response had been very gratifying indeed. Some groups no doubt still had not met this year but she expected they would get in touch too. The various convenors had plans for their tables ready, and she asked members not to forget their donations of anything that might be sold. This year again the Cross-Trails Square Dancers would perform in the evening and tickets would be sent to the schools for the free draw for a child's bicycle.

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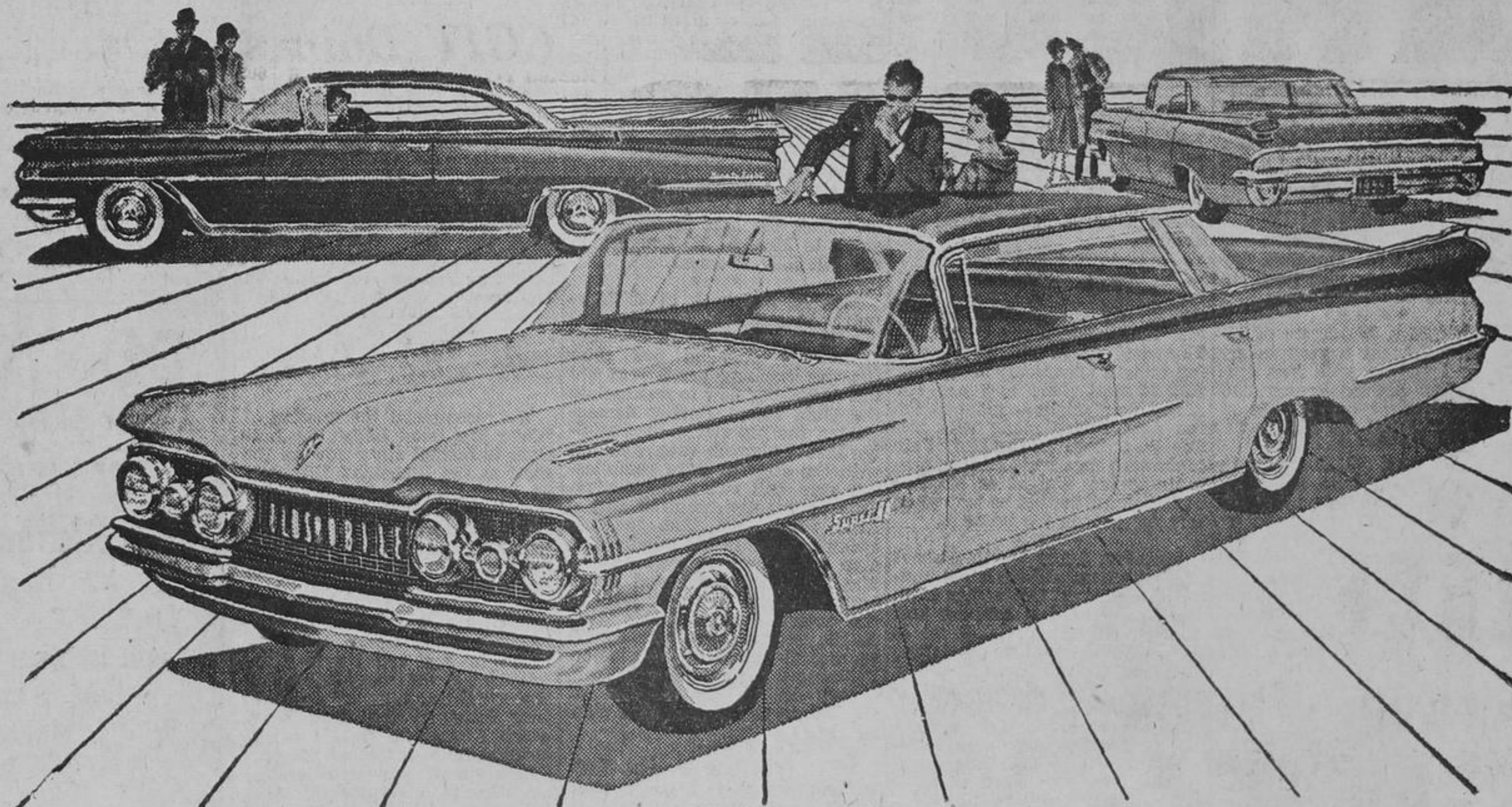


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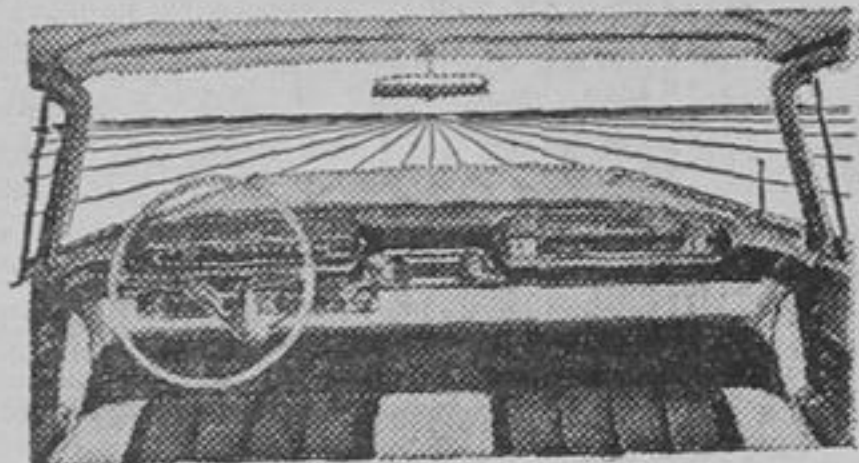
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
