Fall Rally Of Yk. Presbyterian

The Woman's Missionary Society groups of Newmarket United Church extended hospitality to 190 women for the fall rally of York Presbyterian on Tuesday, September 23rd. The sessions were conducted by the President, Dr. Margaret Arkinfall.

Mrs. J. Rutledge, president of the Evangeline Auxiliary, Newmarket welcomed the women of the presbytery.

After a brief business session, Dr. Winnifred Thomas gave a very instructive and inspiring Bible study address. Her topic was "Two Reluctant Missionaries" - John and Peter, whose reluctance was caused by self righteousness and race prejudice. The women responded to roll call, each representative giving a picture of her church to the archivist.
