TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Richmond Hill intends to construct as a local improvement the construction of a 5 foot sidewalk

1. On the south side of Taylor Mills Drive from Alverna Road to Bayview Avenue, and intends to specially assess a part of the cost upon the land abutting directly on the work.
2. The estimated cost of the work is \$1,980.00 of which \$1,061.55 is to be paid by the Corporation.
3. The estimated cost per foot frontage is \$1.80. The special assessment is to be paid in ten equal annual installments and the estimated annual rate per foot frontage is 23.9c.
4. Application will be made by the Corporation to the Ontario Municipal Board for its approval of the undertaking of the said work and any owner may within 21 days after the first publication of this Notice file with the Board his objection to the said work being undertaken.
5. The said Board may approve of the said work being undertaken, but before doing so it may appoint a time and place when any objections to the said work will be considered.

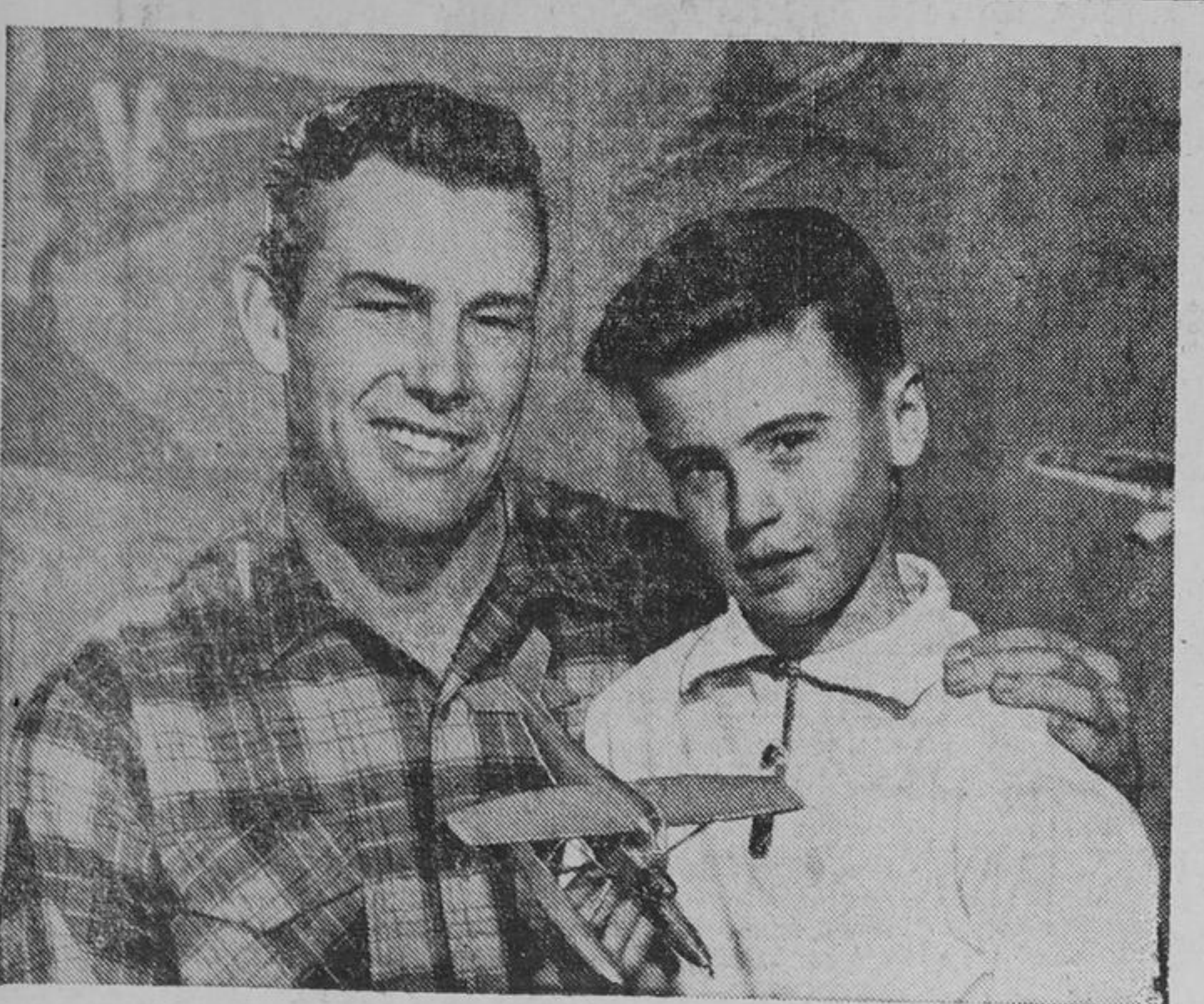
