## Curtain Club's Latest Production The "Happiest Days" Nov. 13, 14, 15

As in past productions the Curtain Club delights in bringing new faces into its plays. For the Happiest Days of Your Life, a farce in the traditions of Quiet Weekend and Passport to Pimlico, there is the happiest blending of new and familiar actors, who between them share a considerable wealth of experience, in stage matters.

Gerald Crack himself is cast in a new role. He has played several leads since he came to Canada, including the doctor in High Ground and the friend in The Marriage which was so successful in the 1958 Regional Festival. This time he has turned to directing and is putting the cast of 14 adults and children through their giddy paces, for in this play the fun is not only in the lines which have unexpected twists and puns adding to the situation comedy, but also there is a great deal of mime, or business.

Playing the headmaster of the boys' school is Duncan Gillard and opposing him (at every turn) is the principal of St. Swithin's School for Girls, the indomitable Miss Whitechurch, played by Edith Jones. Duncan Gillard has a wide background in amateur theatre behind him as evidenced by his appearance in Herman Voeden's "The Play Workshop" production of "Minnie Field" which went to the Dominion Festival finals in Ottawa in 1934. With the Arts and Letters Club he was in Dark Orchid, 1939 CODL festival winner. He has also appeared at Hart House Theatre and done radio plays.

As happy a play as the Happiest Days, the studio production of Spreading the News saw him in his first lead role for the Curtain Club, which he followed up with a wonderful character study of Grandpa Pennypacker last fall.

Edith Jones, who not only has done stock work, but has played many leading roles, finds in the militant Miss Whitechurch a broad field for comedy (in the Happiest Days best punning style). She appeared with the Curtain Club as Virginia in The Third Floor Back and has done dramatic roles for the Footlight Club under the direction of Mrs. Priestman in Thornhill.

Bridget Crampton says that until she came to the Curtain Club she had no dramatic experience, however her handling of the little maid in The Marriage (a wonderful Moscow slut' the adjudicator termed her) and her playing of the maid in Curse you Jack Dalton leave no doubt as to her ability to give the athletic Miss Gossage her full characterization.

Opposing her, as opposed to opposite her, is Rupert Billings of the boys' school, a role taken by a newcomer to the club Ron Solloway. He has played the comedy lead in the White Sheep of the family with the Timothy Eaton players and before he left England was in Somerset Maugham's farce The Spaniard. Warwick Butt takes the role of the younger master Tassel, which involves romantic raptures and pinings in the direction of Miss Harper who naturally enters the play with the girls school platoon. Marylo Graham and Warwick Butt are both experienced in the stage. Warwick having been directed by Tyrone Guthrie at Stratford, even though he was disguised as the front end of the (male) horse in The Taming of the Shrew. Locally he has appeared in Rebecca and in Harvey and is a most versatile worker backstage, being chiefly interested in design.

Marylou Graham has played for Robert Gill at Hart House as Portia in Julius Caesar and was directed in the Trinity College production of Priestley's Linden Tree by Dora Mavor Moore. Richmond Hill saw her a year ago as the ingenue Kate, Mr. Pennypacker's eldest daughter.

St. Swithin's School for girls has only two visible pupils, played by Sandra Wall and Elizabeth McLeod.

At Sandra's school in England,

they did a skit or play every Friday. Her family came to Canada three years ago, and two years ago on the 13th of October moved to Richmond Hill where all three of the pupils are at the High School. Brad Bellis, representing the mischief makers of Hilary Hall as Hopcroft minor studied for four years at Miss Purvey's dramatic school in Toronto, where the students took part in a weekly radio program of plays for children. He has also appeared "On Camera". John Anderson as the school porter enjoys his malapropisms to the utmost. Joseph Rabinowitch, also one of the pioneer members of the club, takes on a role in this play in addition to two small parts in Clerembard, the festival entry which plays two weeks after the Happiest Days in the Museum Theatre in Toronto. Phyllis Fairfield takes the nervous and uncertain parent Mrs. Peck with Ernest Redelmeier as her husband. Kay Wallace, a not a newcomer to backstage chores but in her first stage appearance, plays the sophisticated Mrs. Sower in the other team of parents.
