On their arrival in Bethlehem they found all the lodging places occupied. Some considerate person offered Mary and Joseph a corner in a stable, and there Mary laid the Baby Jesus in a bed of straw in the manger.

Did it really matter to Jesus where he was born? In future years he would not be able to count anything his own. Gladly he renounced the glories of heaven to accept the meager lot of earth's poor and needy, who owned little more than the pallet they slept on and the crust of bread that made up their daily meal.
