NewShop "Encore" Is Now Open

When Mrs. Elizabeth Sargeant decided to open her new shop "Encore" at 55 Yonge St. South, she really hit on an apt name, since "encore" means to repeat again — and is an invitation only given to something good — in this case it's a second lease for that dress, coat or suit you or your husband may have tired of (while there's still lots of wear and style to it).

Mrs. Sargeant the mother of four children aged 8 to 19 years, came from Hollywood — near Birmingham, England — and said she got the idea of a used-clothing exchange, such as Encore, from some friends in Toronto. She then decided to open a shop in Richmond Hill.

Asked by "The Liberal" if she had ever done any selling before, Mrs. Sargeant said, "Yes, during the war. At that time I got fed up not doing any war-work (she is married and expecting a baby), so I got a car and trailer, stocked it with a lending library and skeins of wool and toured the country around Stratford (England), calling in at every little hamlet and village en route."

So successful was this scheme, that Mrs. Sargeant continued supplying reading material and notions to rural customers until the war ended and she and her husband came to live in Canada.

Mrs. Sargeant sells only dry-cleaned clothes in her shop "Encore," charging twenty-five cents on the dollar for her services. Right now she has some lovely evening dresses, suits and dresses on the racks. Tacked on the wall, near her desk are various requests for articles wanted — which Mrs. Sargeant expects to supply through customers who have articles wanted.
