Effective immediately the commission will supply its flat rate water heater customers free maintenance on all the electric components of their hot water heaters. The only exception to the service will be in the matter of tank

replacement. Under the new plan designed to insure a continuous supply of hot water no charge will be made for parts or labour on any service call. 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
