## King City Notes

### Present Window

A beautiful stained glass window in tribute to past members of the Women's Auxiliary, has been presented to All Saints' Anglican Church by present W.A. members.

The new, arch-shaped window, in rich colors of blue, purple, gold, green, yellow and bronze, has been installed on the north side of the building. Honoring women who were members in the past century, the window has the W.A. crest at its top and bears the inscription, "To the Glory of God, All Saints' Church, 1857-1957, given by the Women's Auxiliary (W.A.)."

Later the window is to be dedicated.

### Legion Opening

On Saturday, January 17, the official opening of the Oak Ridges Canadian Legion Hall was held. This occasion marked the end of a year of hard work by the Legion members. Aided by Zone Commander J. Flood this Legion branch was formed and received its charter last January. The members decided to build a hall large enough to fill the needs of the community, and began building in September. A large proportion of the work was done by volunteer labor. Though at times it seemed impossible to have the hall finished this year, it has been completed due to the efforts of the members and in particular of Past President Ivor Williams, and also the generous assistance of Capt. S. Snively.

The ceremony was attended by a large number of guests from Legion branches in District Zones E2 and district residents. Guest speakers were George Windsor, president of the Oak Ridges branch; Mrs. W. Orton, president of the auxiliary; Zone Commander, Mrs. Mabel Clark; Zone Commander, Mr. J. Flood; Capt. S. C. Snively; Rev. G. Winch, branch padre; Reeve of Whitchurch George Richardson; Reeve of King Twp., William Hodgson; Provincial Command 1st vice-president, H. Eaton; District Commander Al Harris; Past President Ivor Williams.

The cutting of the ribbon was performed by Capt. S. C. Snively assisted by Past President Ivor Williams. President George Windsor welcomed those present and thanked everyone for their aid in the building of the hall. Rev. Winch dedicated the hall and spoke of the purpose of the hall as a memorial to those who gave their lives in the wars. Capt. Snively praised the work of the Legion members to make the hall possible. He said that he and his wife have watched Oak Ridges grow from a small farming district to an important suburban community and that the hall will play a great need of the district. President George Windsor presented Capt. Snively with a silver tray to mark the occasion.

Reeve Hodgson said that the hall was a dream of at least ten years for many residents and is the largest completed by any one group in King Township.

District Commander Al Harris presented the branch with a certificate of achievement which is a very exclusive award and held by few branches in Canada. This award was given to the Oak Ridges branch for doing so much work since it was formed last year. Zone Commander Flood praised the work of the members and said he hoped the men would continue to work closely together and that now the hall is completed the Legion hopes to take a more active part in community affairs.

The Oak Ridges Boy Scouts acted as ushers for the ceremony. Color bearers were W. Orton, F. Killick, Mrs. G. Marr and Mrs. R. Leathers.

### Church News

On Sunday, January 4, at the Teston United Church, a memorial window was dedicated in loving memory of Bruce Hadwen, who passed away November 17, 1952, in his 23rd year. The memorial was given by the family, Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Hadwen and son Donald. They were present at the service.

The window is the creation of the McCausland Studios, Toronto, and represents the open Bible with the text "Thy Word is Truth." It is a beautiful window which one must see to appreciate. The inscription reads, "To the Glory of God and in loving memory of Bruce Hadwen 1930-1952. Erected by the family 1958. A fitting tribute to one who was a valued member of the church and who gave himself unreservedly to its welfare."

Rev. Jenkinson and the congregation would like to take this opportunity of expressing their thanks to the family for this beautiful remembrance that is not only a gracious reminder, but also a further aid to worship in the little church by the side of the road.

The annual meeting of Teston United Church was held in the Sunday school room Friday evening, January 16. Preceded by a delicious supper enjoyed by 35 members, the meeting commenced at 8:15 with the singing of a hymn and prayer led by Rev. M. R. Jenkinson. Miss Joan Pelletier was appointed secretary of the meeting. The auditors' report was read by Mr. Roy Robson,

which showed all books to be neat and correct. Assistant secretary of the Sunday School, Miss Evelyn Hare reported a total enrollment of 71 pupils and teachers with an average attendance of 57. Sunday school treasurer, Miss Joan Pelletier reported a balance of \$806.15. Mrs. Charles Robson, superintendent of the Baby Band reported a membership of five and a contribution of \$9.07 to the Women's Missionary Society.

Recording secretary of the Women's Association, Mrs. Charles Robson, told of the 11 meetings held with an average attendance of 21. The group catered to seven banquets and wedding receptions, assisted at a daffodil tea, and the strawberry festival. They packed clothing for Overseas Relief and sent gifts to the School for Retarded Children, Fresh Air Fund, Senior Citizens Fund, the Victor Home and the Toronto Home Missions. This hard-working organization also paid for the installation of a well and water system and improvements to the church kitchen. Mrs. Louise Cooper, Women's Association treasurer, reported a balance of \$366.42. The flower committee report read by Mrs. W. Williamson told of many gifts of flowers and fruit sent to church members and friends and showed a balance of \$119.19. Mr. Roy Robson reported a balance of \$107.53 in the choir treasury. Miss Catherine Fellowship group told of 13 regular meetings, with an average attendance of 19, and special night when the church grounds were given a spring cleaning, a corn roast held in September, and a candlelight carol service conducted in December. The offering from this service was given to the work of the Fred Victor Mission. The Hi-C treasurer, Miss Evelyn Hare, reported a balance of \$43.36. Mr. Gordon Murray reported that \$483.62 had been received for the Missionary and Maintenance Fund of which he is treasurer.

The financial statement of the church was read by Miss Mary Carson, treasurer, showing the year's receipts to be \$2,862.39 with a balance on hand of \$407.25. Mr. Charles Robson stated that \$400 had been sent to the Toronto Home Missions for use in the Church Extension plan. Rev. M. R. Jenkinson read the pastoral report showing that there are 89 members at Teston, and that he had conducted six weddings, five baptisms and five funerals in 1958. The election of officers followed with Mr. Jenkinson in charge.
