

The above sketch by Vine & Robinson, Architects, shows the new elementary school of King City, in S. S. No. 2, King Township, located in the Clearview Gardens and Valentine Acres Subdivisions in King City.

Beige-colored brick is proposed for the modern school, which will contain three classrooms, a teachers' room, furnace room and washrooms. The architects' plan allows for the later addition of four classrooms and a community hall forming an over-all L-shaped design, if

extra accommodation should be needed. W. A. Stephenson and Sons of Willowdale, awarded the building contract for \$55,450, has already started the school. Additional costs of architects' fee, furnishings and landscaping brings total expenditure for the new school within the \$65,000 budget set by S. S. No. 2 school board.

No debenture issue is required as the school is being built with money from subdivision lots fees and a reserve created by the school board.

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
