## Deighton Gains Shut-Out As Thornhill Wins Game

Backed by the tremendous goal tending of Bob Deighton, Thornhill Redmen upset the Aurora Tigers 3-0 in Aurora Thursday of last week to tie their playoffs at one win each.

Deighton who was benched in the previous game was staked to an early two goal lead and he played brilliantly to save Thornhill from elimination.

In the first period, Don Anderson clicked for Thornhill at 2:12 on a pass from Voight. Less than a minute later, Bill Hogg raced in to flip the puck past the Aurora goalie. The game was very fast and the hard checking didn't seem to slow either team down.

At 10:45 of the third period, Bill Bunker faked two Aurora players at the blue line and flipped the puck into an empty corner. Deighton for Thornhill made some almost impossible saves, many from close in and on break-aways, but couldn't be beaten.

Decaire and Patrick were the best for Aurora. Charles, Anderson and Iverson played well for the Redmen. Total shots on goal were by Aurora 33 and Thornhill 27. The shutout by Deighton was his fourth, and it was the first time Aurora had been shut out in four years on their home ice.
