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

In conclusion, Mr. Brennan reported that planning board had passed two recommendations to council; that council should urge the C.N.R. to develop an alternate route; and that council should request Metro to permit several subdivisions in the area to go ahead on temporary septic tanks.

Both recommendations were adopted unanimously by council. Mr. S. Wellum, of Sprucewood Drive, presented the main brief of the joint delegation. Much of it, he admitted, was mainly a reiteration of the various points cited by Mr. Brennan. But he cautioned council about industrial development along a rail line so close to Metro boundaries as the proposed one. "Industrial assessment," said Mr. Wellum, "is an enticing prize, and we should not

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


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
