TOWNSHIP OF KING BY - LAW RE:

GRASS FIRES

A By-Law for Prescribing Times for Setting Fires and Precautions to be observed

No person shall set a fire in the open air in the Township of King after the hour of 9 p.m. in any day and before the hour of 6 a.m. in any day.

No person shall set a fire in the Township of King in the open air for burning grass or brush until he has first notified the Constable and obtained a permit. The notification shall state the follow-

(a) The day and hour when the fire is to be set

(b) The place where the fire is to be set out.

(c) The name of at least one adult other than the applicant who will be in attendance until the fire has been completely extinguished.

(d) The means of extinguishing the fire.

No person shall set a fire in the open air in the Township of King unless and until he shall have present at the place where the fire is to be set out an amount of water, chemical fire extinguisher or equipment, or other fire fighting equipment siutable for the extinguishing of such fire.

Any person convicted of a breach of any of the provisions of this by-law shall forfeit and pay at the discretion of the convicting magistrate a penalty not exceeding the sum of \$50.00 for each offence, exclusive of costs.
