Steeplejack Frank Bush Uses Helicopter

"Operation Whirlybird" was realistically enacted in true traditional TV "Whirlybirds" program style — at four o'clock Friday afternoon of last week at Concord when the pilot of the chartered helicopter from Dominion Helicopters, Ltd., King City, set the machine down on the small parking space in front of the office of the Concord Floral Company, right alongside "The Liberal" reporter's car. The project involved was conceived by Mr. Frank W. Bush of Richmond Hill, noted steeplejack and contractor, whose idea was to have the helicopter raise a two beam wooden platform with cables attached to it, to a point above the rim of the 300 feet high brick smoke-stack, and place it on top of the stack.

With one side door removed, the helicopter, with Pilot R. Ross, Chief Engineer J. Benben, and President J. Fleming of the Dominion Company, quickly gained altitude raising the platform to the required height. To that point, Mr. Bush's experiment was a success, but due to the windstorm, rain, wide floats on the side of the machine, and other factors, the crew was unable to place the beams in position, which were then cut loose to land in an adjoining field. The helicopter then descended to the parking spot for consultation with Mr. Bush and Mr. Bush Sr. to formulate plans for a later effort to carry out this, and similar projects, which is the first of its type to be attempted.

Of the third generation of steeplejacks, Mr. Frank Bush, who has previously used box kites in a strong wind to carry cables across the top of smoke-stacks, told "The Liberal" that these experiments would be continued, using a gondola suspended from a helicopter to enable the platform to be manoeuvred into position over smokestacks, also the possibility of utilizing a helium gas filled balloon, which would be anchored in position by a steel cable, attached to a wind-
