TAKE NOTICE that The Board of Trustees of the Roman Catholic Separate School for School Section No. 1 in the Township of King did on the 9th day of May, 1959, pass Bylaw Number 13 to authorize the borrowing of the sum of \$60,000.00 by the issue of debentures to the principal amount of \$60,000.00 bearing interest at the rate of six per cent.
