TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Richmond Hill intends to construct as a local improvement the construction of a watermain on

- Palmer Avenue from Ruggles Avenue to Lennox Avenue and intends to specially assess a part of the cost upon the lands abutting directly on the work.
- The estimated cost of the work is \$6,110.00 of which \$4,041.84 is to be paid by the Corporation.
- The estimated cost per foot frontage is \$2.81. The special assessment is to be paid in twenty annual installments and the estimated annual rate per foot frontage is 24.5c.
- Application will be made by the Corporation to the Ontario Municipal Board for its approval of the undertaking of the said work and any owner may within 21 days after the first publication of this Notice file with the Board his objection to the said work being undertaken.
- The said Board may approve of the said work being undertaken, but before doing so, it may appoint a time and place when any objections to the said work will be considered.

The youngsters succeeded in catching most of the 500 speckled trout placed in the Humber, supplied by the Canadian National Sportsmen's Show.
