Mr. Ralph feels that the new system will provide a greater uniformity in educational opportunities throughout the township. (Compare now, the many separate classrooms, PLUS a kindergarten in Thornhill Public School, and the two teachers each handling four grades at Edgeley, less than

But most important, the new system will allow the benefits of the expanding industrial assessment to be spread over the entire township, instead of just the school section where the industry is located. This industrial expansion is well under way.


