Enemy of Hay Fever Sufferers It is estimated that 80% of the people in Ontario who suffer from hay fever each year have Ragweed to thank (?) for their complaint. Ragweed flowers from July until frost and the pollen is produced abundantly from mid-July until the frost comes. Relief is sometimes given

by desensitizing inoculations. Regarding these, consult your Doctor. Others try to spend this time in an area free of ragweed.

Ragweed has been classed as a noxious weed under the Ontario Weed Control Act. The plants may be hand-pulled, mowed or sprayed with a chemical. In any case The Weed Control Act demands that the owner of land shall destroy the plants as often as necessary to prevent the ripening of the seeds.
