

In its report the board stated jogs create extra road crossing and are extreme traffic hazards. Roads with jogs are said to be of bad design. With the present population of the area set at 2,800 the board estimated it will grow to 8,000 people in the future. There is a real demand for one main residential north-south street in the area. The jogs would also eliminate the entrance to the land-locked Elgin St. - Clarke Avenue school site.

The Department of Highways approved the original extension for subsidy purposes but did not favour the inclusion of any jogs. The extension will be built to Department of Highways standards ard will receive a 50% subsidy. The actual construction of the road will be done by the township road department.

Road Committee Chairman L. Mumberson tabled estimates for constructing the extension in three stages. Elgin Street to John Street \$3,370.00, Elgin Street to Henderson Avenue \$5,437.50, and Elgin Street to Johnson Avenue \$4,930.00 Specifications call for an asphalt road.
