Permanent sample plots were established early in the life of the forest and from periodic méasurements of growth and yield, information is obtained to determine the proper age to thin plantations and also the degree of thinning required in stands represented by these sample plots.

One of the most significant factors obtained from plots is the rate of growth. The present merchantable volume of one stand visited by the group is 32 cords per acre which added to 19 cords taken out in previous thinnings amounts to 51 cords per acre.

In addition to the measurements taken on sample plots, the department staff has laid out a number of control plots which are left uncut and unmanaged.


