**Y.P.A. Dance Saturday Evening At Victoria Square**

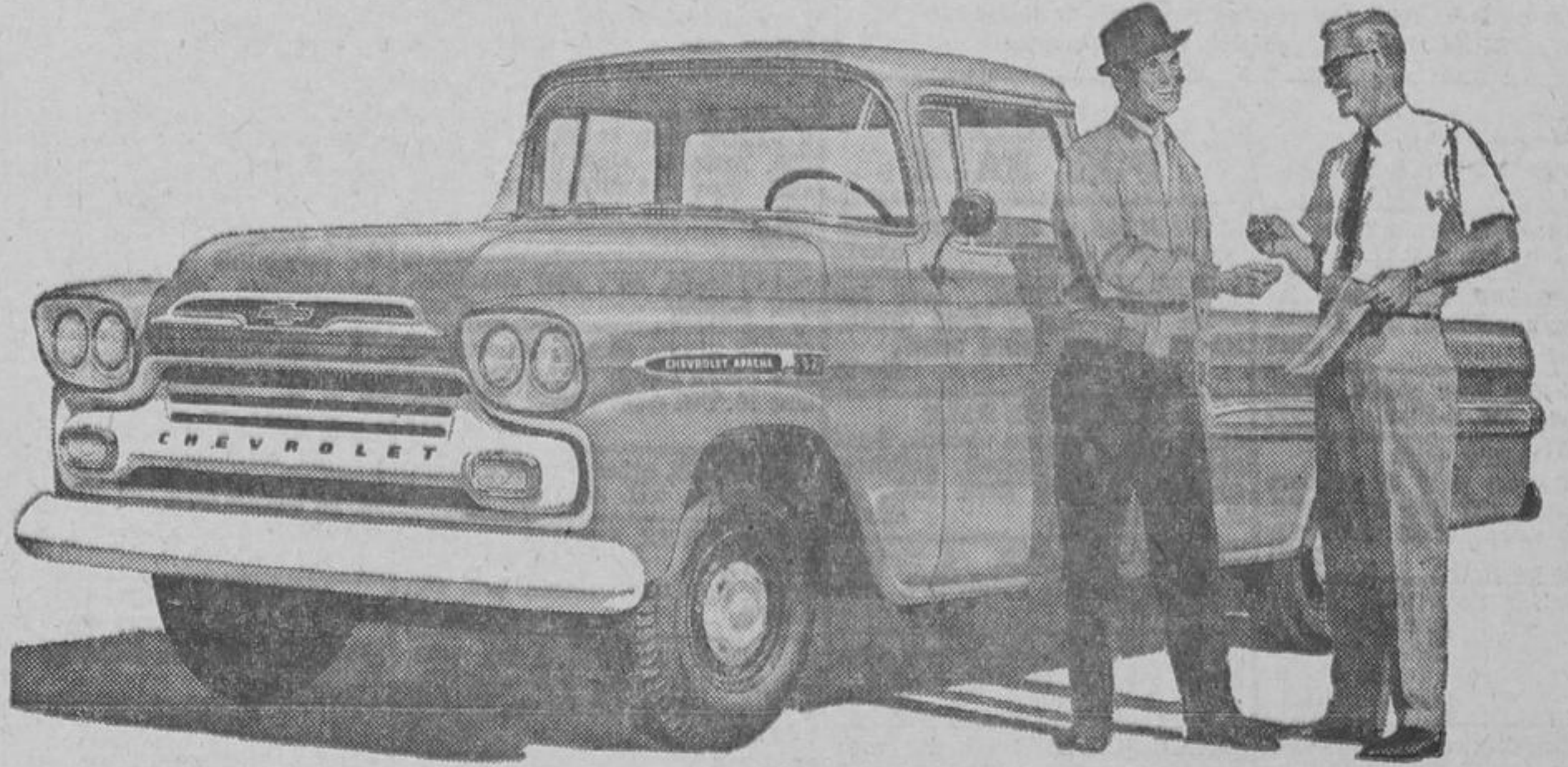

## The Flight of the Thistle-down

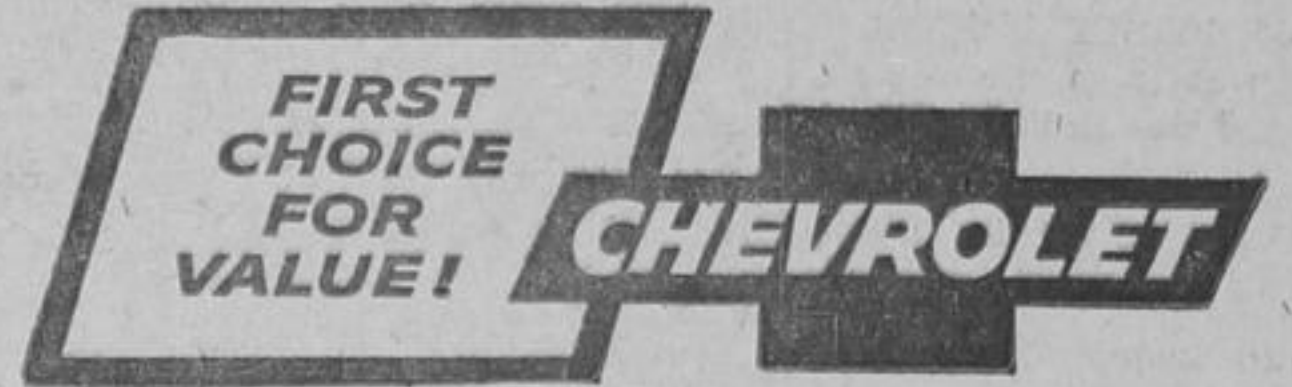
Gone from the thistle, now past its prime,
