Thornhill H & S Meeting

Explain Dissolution School Area No. 1

The seemingly sudden action of the Vaughan Township Council in dissolving the present school areas last June, was in reality very well planned, according to Mr. Gainer Zink, the president of the Thornhill Home & School Association, who addressed the September meeting of the association at the school, on September 17.

The area of the present School Area No. 1, Markham and Vaughan covers the territory from Steeles Avenue north to Richmond Hill and from Bathurst St. to Bayview Avenue. Mr. Zink stated that the schools in this area would be under the present school board until the end of the year. After that time the schools in Vaughan Township would come under a new Vaughan Township School Board to be elected in December and to encompass the entire township.

Markham Township will form a new school area to be known as School Area No. 1 Markham. This area will include all the schools in Markham Township, formerly in School Area No. 1, Markham and Vaughan, together with the German Mills School Section. A school board for this new area will also be elected in December.

Mr. Zink felt that there were several valid reasons why Vaughan Township Council took the step it did, the most important being that the township appears to be on the verge of a large industrial expansion and it was necessary to shake off any ties which might drain off any of the new revenue.

Further, with the possibility of a large influx of population, council felt that it would be desirable to have one standard of education, controlled by one central school board, rather than a multitude of school boards, all operating independently.

And, as Vaughan had the majority of the school population, in School Area No. 1, Markham and Vaughan, Markham could only agree to the dissolving of the present area.

Although a group of ratepayers filed a petition to delay the dissolving of School Area No. 1, Markham and Vaughan for one year or until there was sufficient time to study the effects on taxes, school standards, etc., York County Council did not interfere as the township council was quite within its rights in taking the action it did. The whole matter, from beginning to end, was handled quite legally and within the

The gown was of white silk organza with a square necked bodice, short sleeves and French lace dropping from the neck, around to the back and down to the train. A fingertip length veil of nylon tulle fell from a striking tiara of pearls and brilliants which was placed low on the forehead and added a queenly touch.

A sigh of admiration swept over the audience of over 200 as Mary Lou walked down the ramp and her mother, Mrs. Ethel Fugler, the commentator for the show was, for the first time, I suspect, quite speechless.

Now Mary Lou, was that diamond glinting from your fourth finger, left hand, just a prop, or was that what gave you that very special radiance?

Attending the "bride" was a dainty flower girl in the person of Susan Clark, daughter of Mrs. Ross Clark of Denham Drive, Thornhill. Susan, sweetly conscious of the picture she made, modelled a pale blue, extremely full skirted dress of tucked organdy with back bows, tiny sleeves and a wide double collar.

The "bridesmaids" who themselves provoked an audible gasp of admiration from the audience, were Norma Fugler and Lynn Law, gowned alike in dresses of pink chiffon with tucked bodice, and very full skirts falling from an Empire waistline.

Completing the scene was Mrs. Ward the mother of the bride, wearing a gown of dusty blue lace embroidered with sequins. The neckline was scalloped and the front of the skirt softly draped.

The bride and her attendants carried autumn flowers, arranged by Kathleen Elliott of Arnold Avenue and these made a pretty contribution to the scene.

Another highlight of the evening was Lyn Law modelling a cocktail length evening dress of black silk nylon, embroidered with flowers and sequins and worn over a full pink taffeta crinoline. The low necked bodice was supported by tiny straps and around the waist was a tucked black satin cummerbund. With crystal shoes and Lynn's lovely colouring, the dress was really stunning. Some very striking coats were shown, one a winter white wool casual with sheared beaver tuxedo collar, Norma Fugler wore a three quarter coat of white shag, made of orlon and dynell and guaranteed to be completely washable. It was double breasted and had huge buttons and large patch pockets. The coat is also available in blue, black and red and is sure to be a hit with the college crowd.
