

Extension Bayview Water Main

The Ontario Municipal Board at a public hearing held Thursday of last week at Buttonville approved the further extension of three sections of the 12-inch Bayview Avenue water main. It was approved from Steeles Avenue to John Street, from Green Lane to the railway tracks and north of No. 7 Highway to the Thornlea Public School. The work will cost \$84,100.00 and will be debentured over 20 years. This final approval means this important section of Water | Area No. 1 will now extend up Bayview Avenue from Steeles Avenue to the railway tracks. In addition the board approved the construction of a main on Thornlea Road from Bayview Avenue to a point 583 feet east. This work will cost \$2,800.00.
