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Commended By Town Council

More Than 4000 Now Participating In Recreation Committee Activities

Mayor Kenneth W. Tomlin and members of Richmond Hill Town Council paid tribute to the splendid service rendered by the members of the local Recreation Committee when a report of the year's activities was presented at Monday night's council meeting. All members concurred in the words of the Mayor who said "we extend thanks to the committee for a splendid job during a rather difficult summer."

On suggestion of the Mayor the personnel committee will consider a suggestion that a part time recreational director be engaged. Of such an appointment Reeve Perkins said "I think it would be money well spent. Such an official can be a great help to make sure our money is spent where it will do the most good."

Mrs. Cicely Thomson, Committee Chairman and Mrs. Malcolm Thomson Treasurer of the Recreation Committee attended at council session and presented an interesting and detailed report of the year's activities. Mrs. Cicely Thomson is Chairman of the committee and other members include Dr. John Wynne, vice-chairman, Mrs. Malcolm Thomson treasurer, Mr. William Ruttle, Mr. Grant Gibb, and Reeve Perkins and De-

puty-reeve Tinker representing town council.

The report to council by Mrs. Thomson pointed out that:

"The appointment of a municipal recreation committee sets up the machinery whereby a grant may be received from the province, through the Community Programme Branch of the Department of Education. Since this committee was inaugurated the grant has increased steadily from \$681.91 in August 1957 (after the first year of activity) to this year's \$2,400 (arrived at from the \$600 maximum grant on maintenance plus \$1,800 from the 33 1/4% on salaries. The council grant has also kept pace with this increase until this year the committee received \$4,600 in addition to the \$2,400 grant.

Council also met the need for additional support in view of the more-than-tripled registration for the town playground plan with \$2,000. \$300 and \$150 were also channelled by council through this committee to meet expenses of the majorette corps and the boys' band, both sponsored by the police association.

The 1959 budget estimates for the 22 activities associating themselves or sponsored by the Recreation Committee totalled \$33,205. At that time we estimated that the provincial grant on our 1959 leadership and maintenance costs would total \$3,027. This amount or near it will be

received by the municipality in August 1960, and the committee trusts that it will be turned over to them for disbursement at the committee's discretion.

The subsidies requested by these groups totalled \$13,225 when submitted to us, but were reviewed by us and reduced by \$1,200 when we in turn submitted our budget to the Finance Committee. As I have mentioned we were granted a total of \$7,000 for our 1959 activities. A further revision of assistance to each group was then made.

The introduction of 22 boys teams and 7 girls teams in minor ball and the 1,300 registration in the playgrounds increased the total numbers involved in public recreation in Richmond Hill considerably. In addition the day camp accommodated 500 youngsters. Hockey last winter had a registration of nearly 500; figure-skating, 200 when we add together the numbers involved in the police band, the majorettes, the soccer, track and field, Curtain Club, Teen Town, and Senior Citizens, we get a total of approximately 4,000. We would like to express

appreciation to the many many people who give leadership training and instruction, a great proportion voluntary and at a cost to themselves to make this extensive recreation not only possible but flourishing.

Our bank balance at this time is \$1,400 and we have definite

commitments for \$900. in the immediate future."

The committee report stated there is a growing need for closer administration between the parks and recreation committees and a need also for more co-ordination of committee activities. Thanks was expressed to Mr. Al White who had charge of time-tables for softball and hardball at the park.

Mrs. Malcolm Thomson gave a detailed report of the summer playgrounds program.
