

Await Decision Low Cost Housing

Planning Director R. Forrest informed Markham Township Council Monday there is nothing new to report on recent statements that the Federal Provincial Governments are planning to develop the Langstaff Jail Farm property for low cost

Sometime ago the Toronto City Council owners of the property agreed to hold up its sale until the two senior levels of government have had an opportunity to make a survey of the area as a potential low cost housing scheme. Mr. Forrest felt any housing development would be held up by Markham's zoning for the property. For sometime now Markham has had the property zoned as industrial, and Mr. Forrest felt the two senior Governments would have to respect Markham's wishes on the matter.
