

#### Principal Morrow Made Decision On Initiation

Further to the news item in last week's issue stating that initiations have been cancelled at Richmond Hill High School it should be clarfied that the decision was made by Principal F. W. Morrow. Mr. Morrow explained the reasons for his decision to grade 13 but the actual decision was his own.

It was felt the rapid growth in school population had made it impractical to continue the initiations any longer. There is now a population ratio of 5 to 1 as between grade 9 and grade 13 students. Mr. Morrow advised grade 13 last year that it would likely mark the end of initiations. The North York and Vicinity Headmasters Association meeting in Newmarket last May recommended that initiations be discontinued.
