

NEWMARKET - A Planning tion on Arnold Street just west of Yonge St. The one storey structure will have a frontage of County buildings October 27 and approximately 97 feet with a depth of about 83 feet. The new building will be of structural steel and block not a county planning board construction with exterior finish of brick veneer and porcelain enamel panels on a granite base.

Interior wall finish will be of plaster, painted, and the ceilings will be of acoustic tile. Floor coverings will be linoleum and terrazzo. The contract price for the new building is \$169,489.
