THIS IS WHAT YOU GET — A COMBINATION OF

HOW DOES IT WORK, AND IS THERE ANY SERVICE CHARGE

1. You are billed every thirty days showing purchases, payments plus sales slips, etc.
2. You can pay your account within 10 days of the billing date.
3. You can pay minimum amount each month. This amount is 10% of the balance but must not be less than \$5.00.
4. A service charge (1½% of the unpaid balance) is then added to the remaining unpaid balance and will be shown on your next monthly statement.
