

HOW DOES IT WORK, AND IS THERE ANY SERVICE CHARGE

- 1. You are billed every thirty days showing purchases, payments plus sales slips, etc.
- 2. You can pay your account within 10 days of the billing date.
- 3. You can pay minimum amount each month. This amount is 10% of the balance but must not be less than \$5.00.
- 4. A service charge (1½% of the unpaid balance) is then added to the remaining unpaid balance and will be shown on your next monthly statement.
