Demonstrating Toronto's second drive-up telephone to Reeve Norman Goodhead of North York is W. C. Barnes, local manager of the Bell Telephone Company. The new telephone installation, placed in operation early last week, is located on Yonge St. just south of highway 401 where it is convenient for motorists to pull up and make calls. Mounted on a metal stand, the unit is protected from the elements by an orange hood and has a specially designed light turned on throughout the night for quick and easy visibility from a distance. The Bell installed its first "drive-up" unit on Eglington avenue east a year ago and plans the installation of three other drive-up telephones at various points in the city in the near future.

Dial 'Phones At Maple

Maple's cutover to dial telephone service occurred without incident Sunday morning, reported W. C. Barnes, Bell manager here, in expressing his thanks to Maple residents for their co-operation.
 The two-minute cutover operation culminated nearly two years of planning and preparation.
 Maple residents aided the operation considerably by refraining from placing curiosity calls at the time of the cutover, said Mr. Barnes. "It was scheduled for 2 a.m. because a minimum of calling is done at that time," he explained.
 The cutover from the old magneto equipment to the dial equipment in the new exchange building was a closely co-ordinated procedure. Split-second timing insured that the period when all telephones were "dead" was kept to a minimum.
 The new ALpine 7 exchange is now serving about 600 customers,
