He is not class-conscious or money-conscious to the extent that he is only friendly to those who can further his ambition or interest. Friendly people feel an inward glow of appreciation and good will to others. They cultivate an attitude of friendship to everybody and everything in the whole world. Friendly persons may have one of these qualities, perhaps two - or more - but whoever they are, and wherever they are, I pay tribute to them.
