Municipal Dog Situation Under Control At Last

Mr. Ron Herd, dog catcher at large for the municipalities of Richmond Hill, Markham and Vaughan, in compiling the Impounding Kennels report from May 19 to October 31, 1959, stated that a total of 499 dogs from the three areas had been impounded to date. 1,005 calls regarding complaints were dealt with; 13,000 miles of patrol were carried out in the total area served — and 2,218 meals were served to dogs in his custody during that period.

A total of 253 dogs were claimed by owners and 234 dogs were destroyed, after an average number of 4.25 days in the impounding kennels.

The number of dogs destroyed or claimed, for each municipality, for the five and a half month period, is as follows: Vaughan: 95 destroyed, 86 claimed; Mark-

ham: 65 destroyed, 70 claimed; Richmond Hill: 73 destroyed, 98 claimed.

All three councils are more than satisfied with the results shown by Mr. Herd, and both Markham and Richmond Hill council members remarked last week that the dog situation had never been in better hands.

Perhaps the highest number of complaints received, came in during the month of May when 51 calls were received in three days.

During June, July and August complaints — over 100 a month — poured into the Impounding Kennels on north Dufferin St. in Vaughan Township. Complaints dropped slightly during September and October but the number of dog-boarders in the kennels rose slightly higher than in preceding months. At the time Mr. Herd drew up his report there were 12 dogs still in the pound.
