


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Renowned Psychologist Lynn Surette, St. Luke's FRESH WATER Will Be Speaker Here Area Oratorical Winner

Deputy-reeve Keith Nisbet listed several complaints: (1) There isn't even a mail pick-

up box in Regency Acres. (2) Newcomers to town who are commuters cannot get to the post office in Aurora from Toronto before it closes evenings and have little chance of collecting their mail.

He urged door to door mail delivery but added, "with no elec-tion coming, it will probably take a long time to get it."

Mayor Murray said he has already written the postmaster-general asking that the post of-fice stay open until 6:30 p.m.; he has also written regarding changes in the present building, at variance with town by-laws, but "they haven't even the courtesy to answer my letter."
