**Markham High School Needs \$310,000 10-Room Addit'n**

**Up Admin. Grant Costs Now \$500.00 Per Lot**

A prediction for the not too distant future? On Monday at the regular session of Markham Township Council, Reeve W. L. Clark (commenting on costs for bussing high school students to district high schools), "York Central District High School Board is getting too large — I think we should have our own High School Board in the township."

Speaking of creating a township school area the reeve said it was quite a job to get schools areas dissolved. Referring to the new Township School Area for Vaughan Township, Mr. Clark said, "Vaughan saw an opportune time to dissolve the school sections there with the railway coming in — for the distribution of assets."

Deputy-reeve Wilf Dean said, "With the development and increased school population going on in Markham and Vaughan and Richmond Hill and Woodbridge — our high schools are crowded now. Our Markham pupils could fill a high school like Thornhill themselves."

Council has been hearing a delegation from the Markham District High School regarding bus service — and also to ask for council's approval for an additional 7 classrooms, a lab, general workshop and gym at the Markham District High School at a cost of \$310,000. Deputy-reeve Dean moved that council approve, seconded by Councillor S. B. Watson.

**Administration Grants**  
At a meeting of the Finance Committee held October 28 the committee recommended the adoption of "Administration grants in the amount of \$500 per lot on residential land."

One residential lot on a subdivided property will be free of administration grant. No administration grant is payable on lots

Council acquire a suitable site for a firehall in the Yonge-Bayview area with a volunteer fire brigade.

The committee further recommended the firehall site be in vicinity of Thornhill.

Deputy-reeve Dean said, "It has been proven in Richmond Hill there is a need for paid firemen employees. We are going to run into the same thing in the new area. Its going to run into an awful lot of money."

Reeve Clark said, "Richmond Hill has a tremendous rate of growth — but we shouldn't have trouble in this township getting volunteers. No doubt sometime in the future we will have to investigate these probabilities. The problem grows as the municipalities have to be considered long before we slip into a permanent fire force."

**Our Intersections**  
Mr. Ron Forrest, Planning Director for the township reporting on a meeting with CNR officials and engineers stated to council, "The CNR have agreed to re-design intersections on most roads in question."

Taking each East-West township road they discussed a change of plans. On the 9th the new plan is to make a separation of three levels, CPR, CNR and the township road.

The Kennedy Road crossing is to be raised 29 feet, while at German Mills an eight foot downcut will be made.

Leslie St. will cross under the railway and at John St., the railway cuts over diagonally with a two-lane road structure at this point.

Bayview goes under the railway and there is a possibility the new road installation there may have to be lowered, but that is a matter for the County.

Plans for Dudley Avenue, which have been under some discussion by ratepayers in the district lately, have not been finalized, but will be resolved later. Councillor

J.L. Mumberson said he expects there will be a pedestrian walk at Dudley but it is not known as yet whether it will be over or under the railway itself.

So far Henderson Avenue is the only road going under the railway a mile and a quarter from Yonge St.

Both the reeve and Councillor Mumberson, who attended the meeting with the CNR said, "The CNR was very co-operative in working these problems out." Councillor MacNeil predicted, "There may be more changes before the plans are finalized."

**Co-Ordinating Committee**  
Council authorized a payment of \$100 re expenses for the co-ordinating committee of Markham-Vaughan-Richmond Hill.

**Vaughan Electors Vote Monday**

It is a real job of organization," Mr. Baillie said he had studied other school areas and had contacted the Department of education. He believed people should let the board know what they wanted. He said he knew the farmers wanted to "hold the line" and see "every tax dollar wisely spent."

He mentioned the other candidates as "these auspicious people with more education, whom I am among." Mr. Morley Kinnee, supervisor, and Mr. R. J. Darlington, farmer, nominated Mr. Baillie.

At the conclusion of the speeches Mr. A. L. Snider asked, "Are the teachers running, going to withdraw from the Teachers' Federation? They can't serve two masters," he contended.

Mr. Constable pointed out it was legal under the School Act for a teacher to serve on a board in which he was not employed. And he cited the presence of a teacher on the T. S. A. No. 1 board.

Mr. Hay said there was "no dichotomy of masters in this case. Just getting the best sort of education in the community."

Mr. Robertson cited her coverage of school board meetings from North York to Oak Ridges for the Liberal and the Globe and Mail the past nine years, and said "I'd like to use this knowledge acquired for the new school board." She mentioned her personnel, public relations, and assessment work and said, "I'm the only candidate who seems to have a commercial training and statistical work will be very important in setting up the school board. She pledged her "support to your children and to the furthering of their education." "To the harmony of the teaching staffs," and promised the taxpayer to serve on a "sound economic level." Mrs. Robertson was nominated by two Jefferson School Trustees, Mrs. Mary Terry, housewife, and Mr. Stanley Leno, mechanical.

Mr. Hay was educated in Toronto schools and has a B. A. degree from the University of Toronto. He has served on the Concord School Board for the past three years. He said his "main qualification was simply the realization of the enormous task facing the five man board."

Mr. Hay forswore Vaughan encountering the same enormous growth as North York in the next fifteen years. He is vice-principal of Willowdale Junior High in North Park. Mr. Henry Norden and Mr. Warren Bone, farmer, of Concord School Board were Mr. Hay's nominators.

Mr. Kaiser, a painter and decorator, was nominated by Mr. George Troyer and Mr. John Ireland, farmers. Mr. Kaiser was first elected to the Kleinburg School Board in 1936 and since 1940 has been secretary-treasurer. Mr. Kaiser stated he was "only too glad to help form the new school area and will spend all the time it takes to do it."

Candidate Mr. Baillie opened his remarks by saying the need appeared to him to be for "an organizer." He cited his organizational experience in the Home and School Association and the Vaughan Township Sunday School Association. Mr. Baillie didn't feel previous trustee experience was necessary for the job ahead. He didn't believe "pre-conceived ideas" were good and claimed the new set-up would be "different from anything attempted before."
