> DEPT. OF HEALTH Infant Emergencies

During infancy emergencies may occur when prompt action on the part of an adult could be life-saving. In case of severe CHOK-ING:

(1) Hold the baby head down, by his feet and ankles, and pat him on the back.

(2) If the above fails, put your index finger between his tongue and the roof of his mouth to bring the tongue forward and allow a better airway.

(3) If choking persists take the baby to your doctor or to the emergency department of your nearest hospital. First of a series of articles
