



- Vancouver, Winnipeg, Toronto, Ottawa, Montreal and Quebec, be sure te Include the Postal Zone Number. 3 Tie your out-of-town mail and local mail in separate bundles. Attack the labels that the Post Office supplies. This speeds delivery. Be sure to put

your return address on the envelopes.

- 4 Percels should be wrapped well and tied with strong cord. Print the address. And put your return address outside and inside the parcel. Have parcels weighed at your neighbourhood Post Office
- 5 Mail early. Nothing is so disappointing as Christmas mail that arrives too late. A Post Office leaflet will be delivered to your home giving suggested mailing dates.
