

Increased Number Hunt Licences Sold In 1959

By the end of the recent pheasant season, Regulated Townships in the Lake Simcoe District had sold approximately 6400 Township Hunting Licences. This represents an increase of approximately 800 over the previous year stated Mr. J. S. Dorland of the Fish and Wildlife staff at Maple.

The main increase was in the Township of Markham with total sales of 1100 Non-Resident Licences in 1959 accounting for some 700 of the total increase in the District as compared with 1958.

Data collected by Conservation Officers and Deputy Game Wardens in the field indicated a general increase in all phases of the hunt with the exception of man-hours of hunting which decreased slightly. This was attributed to the fact that during the present season pheasant hunters pursued the sport in a more leisurely fashion not concentrating activities in one or two days' time as was experienced with the short season previously.

Records show that the 1769 hunters checked by Officers took a total of 780 pheasants - 529 cocks and 251 hens. Average showed hunter's success of 44 pheasants per man taking 5.1 man-hours hunting per bird, a slight increase over last year.

In the Township of Whitechurch where 1833 pheasants had been leg-banded previously and released within the Municipality the Department of Lands and Forests check showed that only 51% of the total harvested this fall were birds bearing leg bands.

Hunters enjoyed a much longer season than previously which was considered a definite improvement but still contended with the problem of three separate opening days within the District. During the 16 day open season, the weather was for the most part cloudy with occasional precipitation. This may have made it difficult to raise the birds. It was noted that of the 700 separate hunting parties checked, 382 hunted with dogs.
